

MEMORANDUM OF SUPPORT

PERMIT ARREST OF ABUSERS WHO SEXUALLY ASSAULT INTOXICATED VICTIMS

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The New York State Coalition Against Domestic Violence (NYSCADV) urges the New York State Legislature to hold abusers accountable who sexually assault intoxicated victims and to prohibit perpetrators from using voluntary intoxication as a defense for such offenses. This legislation would amend the Penal Law to add sexual misconduct, rape in the third degree, and criminal sexual act in the third degree as offenses covered under the state's "inability to consent" statute.

The National Sexual Violence Resource Center (NSVRC) states that influence from alcohol and/or drugs can impair an individual's cognitive and physical functions to the extent that they cannot consent to sexual activity. Intoxication can impair a victim's ability to communicate, understand what is happening, and control their conduct.

According to the CDC's National Intimate Partner and Sexual Violence Survey: 2010 Summary Report, in the United States, nearly one in five women have been raped at some time in their lives. The survey also states that 9.5 million, or 8%, of women have experienced alcohol/drug-facilitated rape in their lifetime. Moreover, victims of sexual violence can experience harmful long-lasting physical, psychological and emotional effects.

Currently, under New York State Penal Law §130.05, lack of consent results from forcible compulsion, incapacity to consent, and any circumstances in which the victim does not expressly or impliedly consent. Current statute, however, does not currently include individuals who are voluntarily intoxicated.

Victims of alcohol/drug-facilitated rape should be able to obtain justice after being victimized by sexual offenders regardless of whether they consumed drugs or alcohol at the time of the offense.

NYSCADV urges the NYS Legislature to ensure those who commit sexual assault are held accountable for their crime, regardless of whether their victim was voluntarily intoxicated.
